A major collaboration between the Cork Folklore Project and the Community Work Department of the HSE has been announced. Kieran Murphy (right) has been appointed as Oral History Outreach Officer, funded by the HSE, to work on a part time basis over the following two years under the management of the Cork Folklore Project. The role will be focused on the use of oral history (the recording of people's memories, stories and testimony), to impact positively across Cork City and will include work on Grattan Street Medical Centre, older people's groups as well as research work on the use of oral history with patients dealing with dementia.

Our new Memory Wall!






In the autumn 2018, the Cork Folklore Project, in association with the North Cathedral Visitor Centre, ran a series of folklore and educational workshops at the new **Cork Folklore Project Outreach Hub**. The workshops gave children an opportunity to engage with the stories, memories and folklore collected by the project over the last 22 years in fun, creative and engaging ways. During the workshops, the children had a chance to play an interactive quiz exploring the life of children in Cork in the past, to listen to some of the stories and memories recorded by the project, play the old street games, and listen to Cork folk tales.
